

Who are Responsible Travel?




Why we exist?

- To make tourism a more caring industry

How we work

- We are a digital content company
- 2800 pages of guide content
 - Honest
 - Written by experts
- 20% of leads from paid search (PPC)
- Honesty based commission model




What we generate

- 400K sessions per month
- 4000 leads per month to 400 tour operators offering 5400 tours
- £18m of holiday sales in 2017
- Forecast £1m sales to Finland in 2018

BEST TIME TO VISIT ICELAND



Iceland's far north ocean location makes for fluctuating weather. May-Sep is the best time to visit Iceland if you want to go whale watching; you can combine orcas with Northern Lights in late Sep. Jun-Aug offer endless days, low 20s warmth plus summer festivals. Dry weather inland makes this prime hiking season. Snow comes as early as Sep (and can linger to May) but Iceland can look good too in autumn. Winters can be brutal – but offer the aurora borealis for the long dark hours. Winter road closures make access to some areas difficult.




Our new policy* on elephant trekking and elephant performing is the result of this work.




You can't create the holidays

- Create the framework to HELP tour operators create responsible tours
 - Promote locally owned hotels
 - Responsible excursions e.g. Well treated huskies
 - Local Sami guides
 - Locally sourced food and drink
- Stop those coming in who will not develop sustainable activities
 - No Santa day trips?
 - No large cruise ships?

Don't focus on the numbers

- Focussing on visitor numbers doesn't tell the whole story
 - It's the quality of the visitors
 - Length of stay?
 - Too dependent on one market?
 - Average spend per day?
 - And on what?
 - How much of what they spend is actually staying in Finland?

If you're heading to Lapland we implore you to find out more about the indigenous Sámi people who've made this northernmost region of Finland their ancestral home. Although traditionally semi nomadic reindeer herders, the Sámi are adapting to a changing world with responsible tourism playing a role in keeping alive the languages, music and folklore tales from the Arctic Circle.
