Potential business figures on healthcare in 5 years: The total health expenditure in Australia has continued to grow over the past ten years. According to the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare (AIHW), total expenditure on health goods and services in 2016-17 was ~€111.3 billion. Based on the average annual growth rate of 4.62% over the past decade, it can be inferred that total expenditure on health goods and services will grow at a similar rate over the next five years.

Typical buyer of health services Public and private (either for-profit or notfor-profit) operators. In 2016-17, governments across Australia accounted for ~68.7% of total health expenditure, whilst non-government sources (individuals, private health insurance etc.) accounted for ~31.3% of total health expenditure. In 2016-17, there were 695 public hospitals. Some public-private partnership hospitals have also been established. Aged care providers also represent another potential category of health service buyers. The majority of residental aged care in Australia is provided by non-profit service providers, followed by for-profit operators.

Governmental or legislative climate to support new services/innovations on health: The National Digital Health Agency released the Digital Health Strategy in 2017. The strategy outlines seven key strategic priorities related to digital health. Furthermore, all Australians will receive a 'My Health Record' (electronic medical record) by the end of 2018, unless they choose to 'opt-out'. The 2018-19 Australian Federal Budget also demonstrates government support for new health services and innovation, with ~€0.8 billion funding committed to the Australian Government Department of Health 'Medical Research Future Fund' (MRFF).

Typical buying and/or acceptance process in the country for new solutions: Whilst the major funding for healthcare is decided by the Federal Government, Australia's eight (8) state and territory governments are responsible for the delivery and procurement of healthcare services.

For public hospitals, the procurement of new solutions is generally managed by state/territory health departments via an open tender process.

The procurement of new solutions in the private healthcare sector is generally managed by the private healthcare operators (e.g. Healthscope).

Regulation & Reimbursement environment: Medicare is Australia's publicly funded universal healthcare system, and the primary funder of healthcare for Australian citizens and permanent residents. Australians on higher incomes are encouraged to purchase private health insurance policies that cover both hospital and other healthcare treatments.

Trends & Strategy:

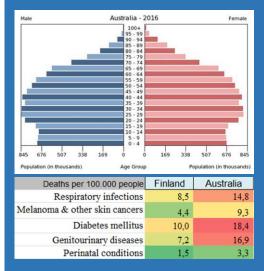
As a result of Australia's ageing population, initiatives and technologies that support elderly Australians to live at home independently for longer are receiving increased funding.
